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





MARTIN McKENZIE-MURRAY is *The Saturday Paper's* chief correspondent. He is a former Canberra speechwriter, *Age* columnist, and advisor to the chief commissioner of Victoria Police.

In 2004, the body of a young Perth woman was found on the grounds of a primary school. Her name was Rebecca Ryle. The killing would mystify investigators, lawyers, and psychologists — and profoundly rearrange the life of the victim's family.

It would also involve the author's family, because his brother knew the man charged with the murder. For years, the two had circled each other suspiciously, in a world of violence, drugs, and rotten aspirations.

A Murder Without Motive is a police procedural, a meditation on suffering, and an exploration of how the different parts of the justice system make sense of the senseless. It is also a unique memoir: a mapping of the suburbs that the author grew up in, and a revelation of the dangerous underbelly of adolescent ennui.

The Ice Age

a journey into crystal meth addiction



LUKE WILLIAMS is an Australian journalist. He has previously worked as a reporter and broadcaster at ABC radio. His written work has been published in The Sydney Morning Herald, The Saturday Paper, the Brisbane Times, Crikey, The Global Mail. The Weekend Australian and Eureka Street. In 2013 he was nominated for a Human Rights Media Award for a long-form investigative piece in The Global Mail. and in 2014 his article on ice addiction, 'Life as a Crystal Meth Addict', was a finalist in the Walkley Awards for Excellence in Journalism.

A topical, insightful investigation into a drug that has taken a ferocious grip on societies around the world — told by a man intimately acquainted with it.

Luke Williams was a freelance journalist researching addiction to crystallised methamphetamine (commonly known as crystal meth or ice) when the worst possible thing happened — he became addicted himself. Over the next three months, he was seduced by the drug and descended into psychosis.

This confronting and illuminating story charts Luke's recovery from the drug, and his investigation into its usage and prevalence in Australia and the Western world. In examining what led to his addiction, Luke also explores the social problems that surround ice, scrutinising whether its abuse is in fact an epidemic, with what we're experiencing now merely the tip of the proverbial iceberg, or yet another moral panic about the underclass. Luke traces the history of methamphetamine from its legal usage in the early 20th century to its contemporary relevance as one of the most foreboding and talked-about illicit drugs in the world, and his search for answers sees him researching meth labs, interviewing addicts and law-enforcement officials, and witnessing firsthand the effects of the drug on individuals, families, and the healthcare system.

Combining memoir with reportage, *The Ice Age* is a vital, compelling first-person account, and an investigation into a drug that is fast becoming the subject of national discussion throughout the Western world.





Why Diets Make Us Fat

the unintended consequences of our obsession with weight loss



SANDRA AAMODT. PhD. is a neuroscientist and science writer. She has co-authored (with Sam Wang) Welcome to Your Brain: why you lose your car kevs but never forget how to drive and other puzzles of everyday life and Welcome to Your Child's Brain: how the mind grows from conception to college. Her science writing has been published in The New York Times. The Washington Post, El Mundo, and The Times, among others. Before becoming a writer, she was editor-in-chief of Nature Neuroscience, a leading scientific journal in the field of brain research.

Based on her viral TED Talk, neuroscientist and science writer Sandra Aamodt explains how the latest scientific research contradicts what you think you know about dieting and weight loss.

In Australia, two out of every three adults and one out of every four children is overweight. We think we know the answer: cut calories. Eat less. We conclude that fat is a failure of willpower, perhaps supplemented by a quirk of genetics. But, neuroscientist Sandra Aamodt explains why dieting not only doesn't work, but is likely to do more harm than good.

Combining deep research and brutal candor about her own experience as a weight cycler, Aamodt gives us several clues into the obesity epidemic based on the latest science, including new findings about gut bacteria, why bariatric surgery works (it has more to do with your brain than your stomach), and what a real alternative to dieting and weight cycling might look like.



Forgotten Anzacs

the campaign in Greece, 1941





PETER EWER completed a first-class honours degree in politics at Macquarie University in 1983, and a doctorate in technology and culture from RMIT University in 2005 that also won a university research prize. Dr Ewer is currently an official in the Victorian Department of Justice, and has published in local and international history journals.

This is the largely unknown story of another Anzac force, which fought not at Gallipoli, but in Greece, during World War II.

Desperately outnumbered and fighting in deeply inhospitable conditions, these Anzacs found themselves engaging in a long retreat through Greece, under constant air attack. Most of the Anzac Corps was evacuated by the end of April 1941, but many men got only as far as Crete. Fighting a German paratroop invasion there in May, large numbers were taken captive and spent four long years as prisoners of the Nazis.

The campaign in Greece turned out to have uncanny parallels to the original Gallipoli operation: both were inspired by Winston Churchill, both were badly planned by British military leaders, and both ended in defeat and evacuation. Just as Gallipoli provided military academies the world over with lessons in how not to conduct a complex feat of arms, Churchill's Greek adventure reinforced fundamental lessons in modern warfare — heavy tanks could not be stopped by men armed with rifles, and Stuka dive-bombers would not be deflected by promises of air support from London that were never honoured.

Until now, there has been no history on the campaign in Greece and Crete written from a truly Anzac perspective. Based on rarely accessed archives and more than 30 interviews with Australian, Greek, and New Zealand veterans, this superb book gives overdue recognition to the brave, forgotten Anzacs of 1941.



GEORGIA BLAIN has published novels, a memoir, essays, and short stories in Australia and overseas. Her first novel, *Closed for Winter*, was made into a film. She has been shortlisted for numerous awards, including the NSW and SA premier's literary awards, and the Nita B. Kibble Award. Her most recent book, *The Secret Lives of Men*, was published by Scribe in 2013.





The Genius of Birds



JENNIFER ACKERMAN has been writing about health and science for the past 25 years. Her most recent book, Sex Sleep Eat Drink Dream: a day in the life of your body, explores what goes on in the body over the course of a 24-hour day. The book, a New York Times 'Editor's Choice', was published in thirteen languages.

For decades, people have written off birds as largely witless, driven by instinct and capable of only the simplest mental processes. But this just isn't true.

In *The Genius of Birds*, popular science writer Jennifer Ackerman presents the latest research on bird intelligence and reveals that birds are much, much smarter than we ever supposed. Bird brains, it turns out, are mostly made of sophisticated information processing systems that work in much the same way as our own cerebral cortices. Whether it's making complex navigations, singing in regional accents, or joking around with humans, birds are capable of high-level abstract thinking, problem-solving, remembering, learning by example, recognising faces, and even conversing in a meaningful way — all with brains so tiny each would fit inside a walnut.

In this entertaining book, Ackerman explores the view of birds as 'thinkers', capable of being cunning, playful, witty, greedy, cranky, joyful, and competitive. Bringing together the latest science from lab and field, she reveals the intelligent bird behaviour that we can see in our own backyards, at birdfeeders, in parks, in city streets, and in country skies, if only we care to look. And in doing so, she reveals what a bird's intelligence may have to say about our own.







This collection of thought-provoking essays explores what it means to grow old in our youth-obsessed world.

Improved health care and increased standards of living mean that each generation is living longer than the last. In response, we are encouraged to remain active, stay healthy and work longer — in short, to refuse becoming old. But if living longer is really about staying young, do we risk turning a blind eye to issues facing the elderly?

Written with intelligence and compassion, Joosten's pieces consider the housing crisis as it affects older people, the politics of nursing-home care, the realities of dementia, and women's changing relationship to their bodies as they age. 

ANDREW HANKINSON is a journalist who was born, raised and lives in Newcastle upon Tyne. He started his career as a staff writer at *Arena* magazine and in 2012 won a Northern Writers Award. He is now a freelance feature writer who has contributed to many publications, including *Observer Magazine, The Guardian*, and *Huffington Post*.

These are the last days of Raoul Moat.

Moat was a fugitive Geordie bodybuilder-mechanic who became notorious one hot July week when, after killing his ex-girlfriend's new lover, shooting her in the stomach, and blinding a policeman, he disappeared into the woods of Northumberland, evading discovery for seven days — even after TV tracker Ray Mears was employed by the police to find him. Bizarrely, the notorious ex-England soccer star Gazza also played a role, trying to get a fishing rod and a chicken to Moat by taxi. Eventually, cornered by the police, Moat shot himself.

Andrew Hankinson, a journalist and a Geordie, re-tells Moat's story using only Moat's own words, and those of the state services which engaged with him, bringing the reader disarmingly close at all times to the mind of Moat. Based on previously unheard tapes recorded by Moat himself, the narrative Hankinson has woven is entirely compelling, even if Moat's weaknesses are never far from sight, requiring the reader to work out for themselves where they should stand.

This is a book in the great tradition of the nonfiction novels of Norman Mailer or Hunter S. Thompson, or perhaps more accurately, given its terrain, Gordon Burn or David Peace.



HANS FALLADA was the pen name of German author Rudolf Ditzen, whose books were international bestsellers on a par with those of his countrymen Thomas Mann and Hermann Hesse. He opted to stay in Germany when the Nazis came to power, and eventually had a nervous breakdown when under pressure to write anti-Semitic books. Immediately after the war he wrote The Nightmare, which preceded his last novel, Alone in Berlin.

The war is over, yet Dr Doll, a loner and 'moderate pessimist', lives in constant fear. By night, he is still haunted by nightmarish images of the bombsite in which he is trapped — he, and the rest of Germany. More than anything, he wishes to vanquish the demon of collective guilt, but he is unable to right any wrongs, especially in his position as mayor of a small town in north-east Germany that has been occupied by the Red Army. Dr Doll flees this place for Berlin, where he finds escape in a morphine addiction: each dose is a 'small death'. He tries to make his way in the chaos of a city torn apart by war, accompanied by his young wife who shares his addiction. Fighting to save two lives, he tentatively begins to believe in a better future.

This unique novel that is nevertheless typical of Fallada perfectly captures the turbulent, troubled atmosphere of post-war Germany. No-one has written so powerfully about the transition from war to peace in 1945–1946 in Berlin as the author of *Alone in Berlin*.

Ignoring their threats, he pushes on, but he's watched by some of the world's most powerful men, who need to make sure this stays under cover. In developments linking 9/11, America's dirty wars, Vatican corruption, the Mafia, and Italy's violence against its own people, Scamarcio has to deal with responsibilities far above his pay grade.

Mark Riebling Church of Spies the Pope's secret war against Hitler


Pope Pius XII and the Vatican are thought to have appeased Hitler and betrayed international Jewry by staying silent during the Holocaust. That accusation earned Pius XII the nickname 'Hitler's Pope', but this narrative is not the complete story. Intelligence expert Mark Riebling uses recently uncovered documents to show that the Church's wartime campaign against Hitler was far more extensive than thought, and that many actions intended to undermine the Nazi regime were approved by the Pope himself. Pius XII was neither a righteous gentile nor Hitler's Pope. He was a politician, at a time when the world needed a prophet.

Lynne Olson Citizens of London the Americans who stood with Britain in its darkest, finest hour


Citizens of London brings out of history's shadows three key American players in London during World War II: Edward R. Murrow, the handsome, chain-smoking news reporter; Averell Harriman, the hard-driving millionaire who ran FDR's Lend-Lease program in London; and John G. Winant, the shy, idealistic US ambassador. Lynne Olson skilfully depicts the dramatic personal journeys of these men who, determined to save Britain from Hitler, helped convince a cautious FDR and reluctant American public to back the British at a critical time. Deeply human, brilliantly researched, and beautifully written, Citizens of London is a triumph.



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Peggy Frew Hope Farm

It is the winter of 1985. Hope Farm sticks out of the ragged landscape like a decaying tooth, its weatherboard walls sagging into the undergrowth. Silver's mother, Ishtar, has fallen for the charismatic Miller, and the three of them have moved to the rural hippie commune to make a new start. At Hope, Silver finds unexpected friendship and a place to call home. But it is also here that, at just thirteen, she is thrust into an unrelenting adult world — and the walls begin to come tumbling down, with deadly consequences. *Hope Farm* is a devastatingly beautiful story about the broken bonds of childhood, and the enduring cost of holding back the truth.



The Unseen Anzac how an enigmatic explorer created Australia's World War I photographs


Cameras were banned at the Western Front when the Anzacs arrived in 1916, prompting correspondent Charles Bean to argue for Australia to have a dedicated photographer. He was eventually assigned an enigmatic polar explorer — George Hubert Wilkins. Wilkins ultimately produced the most detailed and accurate collection of World War I photographs in the world, but over time his work was forgotten, and others claimed credit for his photographs. Jeff Maynard follows a trail of myth and misinformation to locate Wilkins' lost records and to reveal the remarkable, true story of Australia's greatest war photographer.



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Michael McKernan When This Thing Happened the story of a father, a son, and the wars that changed them

Working at the Australian War Memorial for many years, Michael McKernan knew many stories of war. Yet little did he know when he met his future wife in 1989 that her father would be sharing his own story of being made a slave to the Nazis in the Second World War. A consequence of this was that Mychajlo Stawyskyj's son, Joe, would grow up in Australia in time to be sent to fight in Vietnam, where he would become one of that war's worst casualties. McKernan pieces together the disrupted lives of his father-in-law and brother-in-law, creating an unforgettable story about the cost of war.

Caroline Bicks & Michelle Ephraim Shakespeare, Not Stirred cocktails for your everyday dramas



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Tim Colebatch Dick Hamer the liberal Liberal




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Robert Gott Good Murder

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
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Robert Gott A Thing of Blood

Robert Gott Amongst the Dead


